Missing People has partnered with national charity **Lowland Rescue to** launch an exciting new initiative called Search Dog Heroes.

Using volunteer handlers, 100 new search dogs will be

trained and deployed across the UK over the next 2 years, many of whom will be ground-scenting dogs who can find a missing person quickly using articles of scent.

We'll also deliver a national awareness campaign to thousands of families whose loved ones are particularly at risk of going missing – those living with dementia, special educational needs or mental health problems. Over the coming months, educational tools will be available to advise

families and carers on how to prevent and prepare for disappearances, including how to capture a person's scent and safely store it in case the worst happens.

One of the project's aims is to improve

national response to high risk missing persons by encouraging agencies involved in responding to a disappearance to improve referral processes, response rates and awareness.

CELEBRATING 25 YEARS OF BEING





This year marks the 25th anniversary of Missing People and the legacy left by our founders, sisters Mary Asprey OBE and the late Janet Newman OBE. When their friend Suzy Lamplugh went missing, the sisters wanted to do everything they could to find her, but realised there was not an organisation to report sightings and provide support to families. In 1986 they set up the charity from their bedroom to reach out to more people in need.

1986 Suzy Lamplugh goes missing from Fulham in July. Due to the apparent lack of support for missing persons' families, the sisters establish the Suzy Lamplugh Trust

1993 Marv and Janet re-mortgage their houses and register the National Missing Persons Helpline as a charity



1996 The first newsletter is launched, seeking funding from the public to support the helpline



2010 Missing People and Police Service enter into a partnership. To this day, Missing People continues to provide frontline experience and a range of services for police handling missing person investigations, including taking referrals for family support, making Publicity Appeals and sending supportive text messages to missing children and adults

2014 Missing People, in partnership with the National Crime Agency, CEOP and Groupcall, launches Child Rescue Alert – a nationwide

alert system that has the potential to save a child's life in the event of an abduction in the UK

Thanks to your support, our dedicated team of volunteers and staff work hard to ensure we can be a lifeline for people in crisis who are missing or thinking about going missing and their families.

Nicki Durbin, one of our helpline advisors and mother of a missing son, shares her experience of working on the helpline.

Nicki's son Luke went missing from Suffolk in 2006, and Missing People has supported Nicki and her family for several years. Luke remains missing, but Nicki has decided to use her personal experience and unique understanding of the issue to support others via the charity's crisis helpline.

When Luke went missing, my life irreversibly changed. I constantly grieve for Luke but I'm unable to mourn for him. You're left living in limbo and feeling isolated. Missing People not only helped my family with the ongoing emotional impact of losing Luke but also helped generate publicity to



keep the search for him alive. With no new news, families with missing loved ones can struggle to retain media interest as the days turn into months and the months into years".

It's not just family members who call the helpline. I regularly speak to vulnerable people who are missing, or thinking of leaving home as well. Whoever it is, I can offer non-judgmental support to allow them to talk about their situation, and, hopefully, I can help them to find comfort or a safe way home.

It is a real testament to the excellent support our helpline team give that Nicki was inspired to want to work for us.

Peter Lawrence. the father of Claudia who went missing in 2009, has been awarded an OBE in the Queen's Birthday Honours list.



Over the years, Peter has become an incredible support, volunteer and campaigner for the charity. Last year, a new guardianship law allowing families to manage a missing loved one's properties and finances was given Royal Assent. Peter played an instrumental role as one of the families backing the campaign for almost six years.

Peter's tireless campaigning to raise awareness and generate change shows his commitment to helping other families. We couldn't be more delighted that Peter has been recognised in this way and we congratulate him on this exceptional accolade.

Earlier this year, we were lucky enough to be given the opportunity to appeal on BBC Radio 4. We were thrilled to have Jason Watkins share Ben Westwood's story. Ben is a former missing young person who works with us to raise awareness with

the aim of preventing more young people running away. Thank you to those who donated to the appeal, with your help we was able to raise over £12,000 - incredible!
